EAAP is persuaded that this initiative will attract more manuscripts for future meetings, catch the attention of the research community, boost the visibility of the Association and facilitate the spread of information among scientific society. The idea of making the book a referenced point of information for the European research community committed in the animal production sector is the main objective of the Council.

After only ten days since its publication on the EAAP site, the publication has already been downloaded 910 times, testifying a great involvement for such initiative. Due its attractiveness, the number of visits to the EAAP website have consequently increased by 21% compared to the same period before Vilnius 2008. Such result can however be justified also by a greater number of registered participants to Barcelona 2009.

Plenary Session

EAAP plenary session is becoming a central appointment for the annual conference and, more generally, we think for the animal science community. Every year we organize a plenary session trying to meet the interest of the participants of our annual meeting by dealing with a special and important topic. We had many positive comments last year when we dealt with the cloning in animal farming. This year we plan to have a loner session to be able to accommodate four exceptional speakers chaired by Carlòs Lopez-**Fanjul** who will do a short introduction to the plenary session. The first speaker is **Moshe Soller**, he will deal with Darwinian Evolution and Animal Breeding: Past, Present and future, after re-reading the origin of species book with an animal breeder perspective. The chair of the session, Carlòs Lopez-Fanjul, will be the

second speaker dealing with the evolution theory and mechanism with the intentions to explain the important rules about how evolution theory works for animal farming. Then he will pass the microphone to **Paolo Ajmone Marsan** who will clarify the evolution history of domesticated animals comparing the DNA footprints with the Darwin's theory. The last speaker of the session is **Miguel Angel Toro**. His speech will be dedicated to future trends in animal breeding starting from Darwin's theory to the modern and future technologies of animal breeding and reproduction. The entire session will be captured on film and rendered available in the future in the EAAP website.

Session 31

At the annual conference, EAAP is organizing a round table on valorising local animal products, much in line with the general title of this annual meeting. The chair of the session is Enric Canut (Consultant for Cheese and Food Quality Products, Barcelona), then we have four invited speakers. The first is Francois Casabianca, a very active scientist from the INRA laboratories of Corte (Corsica island - France). He is a member of the EAAP of the Mediterranean contact working group and the main organizer of the last EAAP Mediterranean conference held in Corsica, November 2008. He will deal with the basing economic sustainability of local livestock populations on quality products. The chair of the meeting, Enric Canut, represents the view of the relative industry and, in fact, he will detail the industrial experience of producing and marketing quality food from local animal breeds. The global recognized and successful organization dealing with quality food is the "Slow Food" based in Italy. Cinzia Scaffidi will tell us about the Slow Food activities to support products of local breeds. Finally we thought that it would be interesting to end up with the opinion of someone who is using the animal products to render them marketable and a real "wonder" for the consumer. We asked to Santi Santamaria, an expert gastronome, to talk about what makes an animal product a gastronomic wonder. The round table discussion will be then handled and chaired by **E. Canut**. We think that this meeting will be very much attended for the curiosity that we raised on you and for the importance that has in the framework of the main topic of the annual session.

EAAP ACTIVITIES

Meeting in Montréal

The EAAP President, Kris Sejrsen, and the Secretary General, Andrea Rosati, had accepted the invitation of the American Society of Animal Science (ASAS) to attend their annual conference that was organized in Montreal (Canada) in the beginning of July together with the American Dairy Science Association (ADSA) and the Canadian Society of Animal Science (CSAS). The meeting was very itnersting and well organized and lot of interesting papers were presented. The President and the Secretary General were invited to participate to some special activities, like attending the Council meeting of ASAS. Furthermore they attended on behalf of EAAP some important meeting with people participating to the Montreal conference. A very important draft agreement were held with the ASAS management for approaching jointly, in different ways, scientists resident in non EAAP countries, and to attract them towards the activities of ASAS and EAAP. Next year meeting of ASAS/ASAS will be held in Denver (Colorado, USA).



Visit to Zadar to prepare the Mediterranean working group meeting

On August 5th and 6th, the EAAP Secretary General **Andrea Rosati** visited **Jozo Rogosic** (local chair of the organization) and **Milan Zjalic** (EAAP Croatian consultant) in Zadar (Croatia). The objective was to organize the EAAP Mediterranean working group to be held in October 2010. During the stay they visited the location for the meeting, the possible places for the

technical tour. They also met the deputy mayor of Zadar and the director of touristic office, looking for local support. The meeting is planned to be held on October 27th-29th 2010. Much more will be discussed and defined by the Mediterranean working group and the CIHEAM (with whom we jointly organized the meeting) representatives. The Mediterranean working group meeting was never held in Croatia. We are optimistic that will be a wonderful meeting for the beauty of the location, the efficiency of the facilities and the enthusiasm of the local people.

Report EAAP Websites

During the year the EAAP website has been on the average visited 260 times/day (total number of visits in a year 93.800). The monthly distribution of contacts is reported in figure 1.

Each visitor visited an average of 4.7 page/time

Data demonstrate that the peak of visits are reached immediately before and after the Annual meeting (August-September) and during the period of submission of abstracts for the new annual meeting (Jan-Feb).

The most visited page is the Vilnius 2008 section attracting the major part of visitors.

VILNIUS REPORT AND MOST VISITED SECTIONS

The Vilnius 2008 Annual Session has been visited 5.400 times in a year and the peak was reached immediately before and after the annual meeting, when around 9.900 papers have been downloaded.

Videos recorded in Vilnius, probably due to their size, received less attention and have been downloaded around 60 times/month (820 visits/year).

The range of visits/session ranges according to the table 2, demonstrating that the most visited time is the period immediately around the annual meeting.

ANIMAL JOURNAL

Introductory note: Animal Journal has two sites managed by EAAP and Cambridge. The following results are presenting data as extracted by the EAAP server.

The Animal Journal website received a great attraction by scientific community as reported in the following diagram that summarises the number of visits/month.

The average number of visits/month is 3.010 for a total of 36.050 visit/year. Basing on the IP^a of the users that contacted the ANIMAL Journal website, the distribution of countries is summarised in figure 6.

^aIP = Internet Protocol is the number that is assigned to allow the identification of the connextion to the web.






Figure 3. Other most visited pages of the EAAP website (visits/year).




Figure 4. Number of visits by month to Vilnius secion pages of the EAAP website.




Figure 5. Number of visits by month to Animal Journal website.






Figure 6. Country of origin of Animal users from the web

Basing on the IP address of the users that contacted the ANIMAL Journal website, the particulars of distribution of countries is as in table 3.

Users who entered into Animal from generic search engines mainly used the word animal and it demonstrates that Animal is correctly listed in the search engines being reported in the first pages even after a generic query.

REDNEX

A Rednex Symposium on Protein Metabolism and N excretion in Dairy Cattle will be held at the EAAP annual meeting in Barcelona on 24 August 2009 in the morning (Session 2, 8:30 - 12:30).

Dairying is an important sector of EU agriculture, but intensification has been accompanied by an increase in nitrogen surplus in the cycle between the animal, the crop and the soil. This has a negative environmental impact on groundwater (pollution with nitrates), surface water (eutrophication) and on the atmosphere (de-nitrification and ammonia volatilisation). The EU seeks to stimulate measures that improve management of nutrients, waste and water as a start to move to management practices beyond "usual good-farming practice".

The objective of RedNEx is to develop innovative and practical management approaches for dairy cows that reduce N excretion into the environment through the optimization of rumen function, an improved understanding and prediction of dietary N utilization for milk production, and excretion in urine and faeces. Dissemination and knowledge interaction will use a participatory approach to include the views of stakeholders and recognition of the need to provide support to EU neighbours.
